# Transitional and long-term aid

# **SERVICE AREA:**

Housing support services are available in Erie, Huron, Ottawa, Richland, Sandusky, Seneca, and Wood counties.

### PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

Provides long-term housing assistance for participants who are homeless and have at least one family member with a verified disability and are able to live independently. Services are also available for victims of domestic violence.

# **RAPID REHOUSING:**

Provides short-term housing aid for clients who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless and are in need of temporary housing.

## **GUIDELINES:**

Participants must be able to find a housing unit with a fair-market rent and a landlord willing to work with the program, and pay 30% of their gross income towards rent.



# **Veteran-specific services**

# **SERVICE AREA:**

Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) housing support is offered in Erie, Hancock, Huron, Lorain, Lucas, Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca, Wood, and Wyandot counties.

# **ASSISTANCE OPTIONS:**

May provide help with past-due rent, first month's rent and/or security deposit, hotel/motel vouchers, and utility assistance and/or deposits (if related to a housing crisis).

SSVF may also be able to assist with moving costs, case management, and referrals where appropriate.

### **GUIDELINES:**

SSVF serves veterans who are homeless, facing homelessness, or have difficulty securing housing and are at 50% or below of the county's median income. Current or potential landlords must be willing to accept a payment voucher from GLCAP.



# **HUD Guidelines**

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines consider persons to be homeless if they are living in an emergency shelter, motel paid for by a charitable organization, tent or campground, or a place not meant to be lived in such as a car, park, or abandoned building.



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
